There is so much to cram into the final two months of the Veterans' League bowling season with many titles, honours and disappointments to be resolved and much heart-ache and soul-searching still to take place.

One matter already determined is the destination of our prime individual trophy, The Examiner Rose Bowl, with Mick Cox of Lockwood Con claiming the 49th holding of this, our most prestigious, competition. A wonderfully sunny day at Almondbury B.C. with temperatures north of 30 degrees with endurance added to the skill and tactical nous required to win this trophy all in evidence. Mick Cox was making his third appearance in the Final and no-one can begrudge him his first title in his day of success against a spirited Tony Butterfield of Kirkheaton Con making his first appearance in this competition after only qualifying by age this year. It could even have gone Tony's way as he held a 17-11 lead before Mick stormed back to win 6 of the final 7 ends to run out a 21-18 Champion.


The climax of the Inter-District season also has our attention as our side has a very real chance of lifting this title for the first time since 2014. With a final fixture between the top two teams with our representative team sat in second position just eight points behind leaders West Riding. Even Halifax in third spot can still lift the title if things are tight in the title decider then their game against lowly Leeds could be decisive.

Many Knock-Out competitions for individuals, pairs and teams are still to be decided and a packed August programme with resolve the outcome of six of those titles and the remaining three will have to wait until early September to determine their 2019 destinations.

The League programme is two-thirds complete but it would be a brave man who would confidently name any Section Champion or promotion certainty. Lowerhouses seem a strong bet in Section 4 and a couple of teams have been self-nominated for relegation but otherwise it will not be over until the fat lady sings!

For a long time it looked as if Tony Butterfield would make his four-handicap start pay dividends as he built an impressive 17-11 lead by using a long mark in front of the clubhouse.

OVER-80's KNOCK-OUT

The Over-80's Knock-Out competition is one of my favourites to observe as it tends to throw together bowlers who have known each other a very long time and mutual respect abounds. This season's Quarter-Finals was held on the Outlane green and what great shape that green is now in. Major reconstruction over the last 12 months has been rewarded with a wonderful surface although I don't think the Over-80's relished the visit at all as heavy rain right through the morning threatened to result in a 'chucking match' which is rarely the preferred format for our senior competitors. However the rain abated as the four Quarter-Finals got underway and the first match off was between a pairing with a combined age of 173, Frank Barraclough (91) of Marsh Utd and Eddie Hine (82) from Kirkheaton C&BC. It was quickly clear that a couple of the 'younger' Over-80's fancied a long mark to test the muscles of their opponents. However a quickly drying green soon eliminated that approach and good competition materialised. With match referee Ray Tunnacliffe busily patrolling the boundary and the ever-attentive markers provided by the

hosts in frequent demand as doubtful eye judgement and increasing desperation resulted in some dubious calls for measure, usually between woods but occasionally calling the long tape into action as marks were challenged. Then suddenly it was all over. Just 35 minutes after starting the business was completed in all four ties and all retired to the ever-available bar, serving more hot drinks than pints and the verbal post-mortems went ahead as the results were dissected and compliments shared between opponents. Another very enjoyable day and another to look forward to on Friday 16 August when the four survivors will tramp out to Hemplow for Finals Day. As is tradition the programme is shared with the Julie Fuller Trophy Final. The two Over-80's KO Semi-Finals begin at 1.00pm with the finalists having a rest whilst the Julie Fuller Final is played with all three pairs matches going ahead at the same time and then that is followed by the Over-80's Final. A really good day out with two competition finals completed before your very eyes on the same green on the same day. Great value, not to be missed!

KNOCK-OUT UPDATES (1)

Time for a full update on our Team and Individual Knock-Out competitions as we approach the business end of the season. The Rose Bowl and Over-80's have already been covered earlier in this newsletter so let's first of all concentrate on the team knock-out competitions to see which teams are still in contention and what chances they each have of lifting a trophy this year.

The Bistro is a unique 10-man competition with a team handicap system in place and a five—pairs format which has become a great leveler over the years with a series of surprise results and giant-killing acts and that continues to hold true once again this year. Brockholes B.C. continue to sponsor this event and the Final will be our last Final of the season when held on their green on Thursday 12 September.

The eight Quarter-Finalists include four from Section 1 with representatives in three of the four ties. The odd one out being the all-Section 3 meeting of Bradley & Colne and Slaithwaite. Both are in the top three in that Section, both are on a +20 handicap and Slaithwaite have a 9-0 drubbing over their opponents already under their belt this season.

There is one all-Section 1 tie when Marsh Utd A and Lockwood Con A meet at Almondbury Lib with a Section 1 v Section 3 semi-final lined up for the two winners. Lockwood Con are only at this stage courtesy of a 'penalty shoot-out' in their last tie against Netherton Con A following a 97-97 tie with Lockwood taking the game count 3-2 and passage to the quarter-final stage.

The other two Quarter-Finals are Section 1 v Section 2 formats with Longwood facing Brockholes A at Bradley & Colne and then Section 2 leaders Crosland Moor take on Golcar Lib A at Holmfirth with all four ties being contested on Yorkshire Day.

The draw has ensured that we will have Sections 1 v 2 Final on 15 August.

The <u>Julie Fuller Trophy</u> is the well-established knock-out event for all 30 teams in the 6-Man League with a three-pairs format and the aggregate score determining the winners.

Reigning Champion Graham Illingworth now of Crosland Moor remains in contention and he faces Eddie Haigh of Clayton West at the Rugby Club for a place in the last 16.

The <u>Lower Divisions Trophy</u> Finals Day will now be staged at Outlane on Friday 23 August but before then we have to bowl down to the last eight and that takes place at Broad Oak on Tuesday 6 August. Reigning Champion Mick Ralph of Springwood continues the defence of his title when he faces team-mate John Hoyle. There are six Springwood bowlers still in the competition and inevitably another couple of them will meet up as well as John Pix and Colin Hampshaw will be up for bragging rights in their head-to-head.

CANALSIDE GREEN CLOSES

We have lost another green with the mid-season closedown of the Canalside green with just three weeks notice of intent to shut down at the end of June. Having lost the back green last year the final rights are being read for one of our founder clubs although they have been renamed several times as their landlords have changed over the last 50 years.

Promises of continuity of access to a playing surface have not been upheld and all 11 teams, including the Veterans team, have decanted to Moldgreen for the rest of the season. It is difficult to forecast what may happen in the future but having been misled by their landlord it is difficult to see any reason that members would want to get back into a relationship with someone who has scant regard for grassroots sports and the history that goes with it.

50th ANNIVERSARY BOOK

HALF-TERM REVIEW

This Review looks back on the first half of the season in the **6-Man League** with the report compiled at exactly the half-way point and just prior to matches on 23 July.

It's a tight call at the top of Section A with three points separating the two prime contenders for the 2019 Championship with Lindley Lib A currently leading the way. They have won their first nine matches, the latest two by the ultimate 7-0 scoreline, including a 5-2 home win over current Champions Netherton Con. That is the only setback to the defence of their title for the Netherton team but despite that they are only three points off the top with the crucial match against Lindley Lib being on their own green so every point is vital before that fixture on the 'Glorious Twelve'.

Shepley A continue to niggle away in the slipstream of the top two and it is not inconceivable that they could yet move into contention. First half defeats against the top two and crucially away at Crosland Moor have dented their challenge but no team has recorded more 7-0 wins than them and they remain just one good win away from a serious threat to the two leaders. In addition, they have the Section's top individual bowler, W Hartley, with a 10-0 win record so the potential to creep up on the leaders is certainly within their grasp.

Milnsbridge, Paddock I&C and Crosland Moor keep exchanging places in a keen mid-table contest but it difficult to see any of them progressing higher than their current status and the depth of their ambition will probably remain at being top of the mid-table battle.

The only fixtures that **Brockholes A** have won have been against the three teams below them in the half-way league table probably determining the limits of their current capabilities and with away games against the top three scheduled a mid-table destiny seems their best hope.

Thongsbridge A lost their opening four fixtures before recovering somewhat but then succumbed to Farnley Tyas in their first and only win of the season to date to close the first half-season campaign on a down note. Yet they could still have a considerable influence on the top positions as all three of the prime contenders have still to visit them on their own green.

Oakfield T&BC have a terrible away record this season with five straight defeats, three of them by the 0-7 score and only picking up a point in each of the other two to log the worst away record in the Section. Their good home form will have to continue if they are to avoid relegation but with home games to come against the two teams immediately above them in the table then their fate is in their own hands. Farnley Tyas have had a difficult first half of the season only recording their first win in the final fixture. Key player availability being a major problem this year but after finishing last season just two points off of second place they will be disappointed to find themselves at the very foot of the table. Those bowler availability problems may be easing and with all four of their remaining home fixtures against teams outside the top three then all is not lost.

It is just like the good old days with **Lockwood Con** and **Longwood** locked together at the top of the league table the only difference being that this year it is the Section B table rather than the top Section. That wont matter a jot to these two old rivals as their re-entry into the league after a one-year sabbatical has been warmly welcomed and their rivalry regenerated and closely monitored.

Currently Lockwood Con have the advantage having recorded eight victories including crucially a 4-3 away win at Longwood. Three defeats so far for Longwood is not title winning form and when one of those is the only win of the season for bottom team Almondbury Lib then they have some way to go to push their way into the title

race. However, despite all that, they remain just one good win off top spot and their history suggests that they will not be satisfied with anything less so expect a determined second-half of the season performance from our three-times Section A Champions.

Golcar C&BC have built on their first season finishing position of fourth in Section B to register considerable progress this term. Away wins at the top two show their potential, still within striking distance of a promotion place but home defeats by both Skel Windmill sides shows a weakness that will need to be addressed before the top two come calling in key August fixtures. Promotion is very much in their own hands and gate-crashing the Lockwood-Longwood promotion party would be a welcome interruption to the otherwise inevitable cruise back to the top level for two old campaigners.

The two Skel Windmill teams sit together in fourth and fifth positions with similar playing records but very different balances. The A side have a 4-1 win home record whilst the B team has that same record for their away performances. The season opened with the two teams meeting each other and the A side coming out on top with a 6-1 'away' win. They also became the first team to win away at third-placed Golcar C&BC this season but 1-6 defeats at the hands of the top two shows how far they still have to go to become a significant threat at this level. Only the leaders have collected more away points than Skel Windmill B but only one win from four home games identifies the area of improvement required if the team are to overtake their clubmates and ultimately post a promotion threat.

Clayton West were 'relegated' last season due to the reorganisation of the Sections and seemed to have some sort of hangover from that as they lost their first four matches of the new season. Subsequently they logged three consecutive 5-2 wins to move away from the drop zone and will expect to continue that improvement and rise up the table that goes with it. Primrose Hill Lib seem to have a penchant for the 6-1 scoreline as it has been the outcome in six of their first nine fixtures - unfortunately four of those six going against them. A five-match losing run started the season but three consecutive wins steadied the ship and they now sit six points away from a relegation place so no slacking as they enter the second half of the season.

One point behind Pip Hill sits **Golcar Lib** who have had a worrying introduction to Section B bowling after being relegated last year after finishing at the bottom of the Section A table. Three wins in their first four matches promised a lot but that

has not been sustained with a five-match losing run closing the first half of the season.

Worrying times for the bottom two with two relegation places still to be assigned for the first time this year. Almondbury Lib's solitary success this season was a surprise 6-1 win over promotion contenders Longwood which came right in the middle of their nine-match first half of the season. More will definitely be required if they are to avoid a second consecutive relegation. In danger of going down with them is Holmfirth who have lost all four home fixtures whilst having the best away points total of the five teams in the bottom half. It is obvious where the improvement is required to ease their way out of relegation trouble.

Five of the ten teams in Section C are first time entries to our League and two of those sides currently occupy the two promotion places. The Marsden Park side are comprised of bowlers from the defunct 10-man side from the same club and used to playing at a higher level than this and that is showing as they clocked up nine straight wins. One of those being against their nearest challengers for the title, Marsh Utd, which proved to be the solitary reversal for the Marsh side. Both teams look set for promotion already and the second half of the season could become a bit of a procession unless something dramatic happens and fairly soon at that.

Third and fourth places are also held by new teams with **Greenhead Park** sat behind the leaders and **Hemplow** a further place back in fourth slot. Both teams should be encouraged by their promising starts especially the Park who got better as the season progressed winning five of their last six matches. Hemplow can be pleased with their early form as well winning more games than they lost is always a fairly good indicator.

Meltham are becoming a good barometer at this level as they lose to the teams above them and beat teams below them in the table. Just being four points off third place should act as a second-

half incentive and it wouldn't require too much improvement to see them climb a place or two before the season ends.

Thongsbridge A started the season brightly and three opening wins raised hopes of a stronger campaign but then only one win from their next six put such thoughts behind them. Fifteen points from their four home and the same total from their five away games shows that they are comfortable on the road but it appears that a mid-table placing is likely to be the peak of their ambitions this year.

Six straight defeats was not the welcome that Lindley Lib B expected from their first start in the 6-Man League but that was followed by three wins to complete their first half-season and looking towards a brighter future. It does appear that this team's fixture programme is geared up to two different levels which will be repeated in the second half of the season. It will be interesting to see if progress has been made against the teams to be faced in the opening section of the second half and confidence should be higher after that better closing sequence of results.

Marsh Lib continue to improve as can be seen by holding the best 'Aggregate For' total of the five teams in the bottom half of the Section even if it isn't matched by their points total which I believe will continue to grow.

Brockholes B have finished bottom of the bottom Section for the past two years so anything other than that will be regarded as a success and that is where they are now. One place and five points off bottom spot with one win to date even if it was a monumental 7-0 victory. Bottom team Shepley B have had a torrid introduction to the 6-Man League with nine straight defeats but almost a stupendous win over promotion challengers Marsh Utd with a 3-2 game win but a 73-76 aggregate reverse saw them go down 3-4 to their opponents. Reproduction of that kind of performance would without doubt signal happier times ahead.

FORECAST: If you are looking for any kind of forecast as to the end of season Section Champions then it is easy to suggest that the three current leaders will continue to flourish and claim the silverware this year. My one doubt is in Section A where I expect a stronger second half from Netherton Con as they surge through to successfully defend their title success of 2018.
